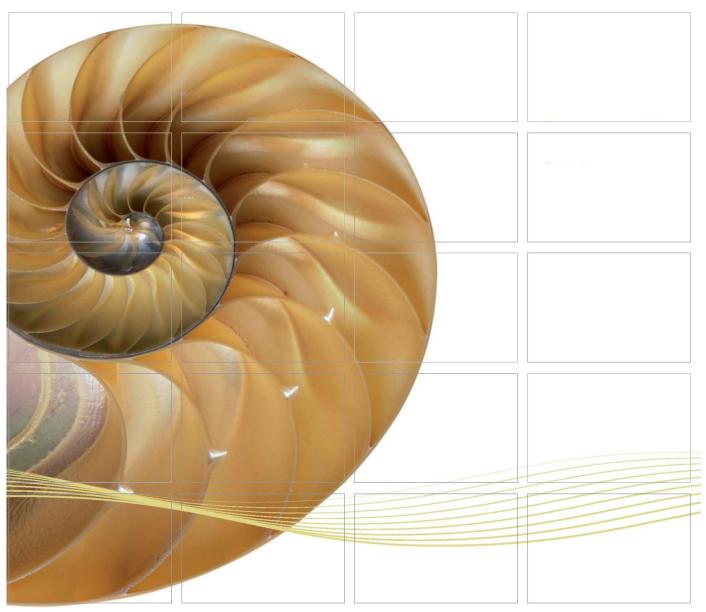

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The construction works of the installation of submarine gas pipelines and associated facilities from To Kwa Wan to North Point for former Kai Tak Airport Development ("the Project") commenced on 13 June 2012. This is the 23rd Monthly Environmental Monitoring and Audit (EM&A) Report presenting the EM&A works carried out during the period from 1 to 30 April 2014 in accordance with the EM&A Manual of the Project ⁽¹⁾.

Summary of Construction Works undertaken during the Reporting Month

Works undertaken in the reporting month include:

Submarine Pipeline:

- Substantial completion of armour rock backfilling from CH0030 to CH3000;
- Completion of reinstatement of granite facing stone at To Kwa Wan cofferdam;
- Completion of repairing works for marine pipeline risers at To Kwa Wan cofferdam;
- Substantial completion of removal of pipe piles and backfilling at To Kwa Wan cofferdam;
- Substantial completion of backfilling of rock mound at North Point cofferdam;
- Completion of reinstatement of seawall blocks at North Point cofferdam; and
- Substantial completion of ICCP system installation for 450 mm diameter submarine pipeline.

Landmains (To Kwa Wan and North Point):

- Completion of reinstatement of North Point Pigging Station; and
- Completion of rectification work at San Ma Tau Street Carriageway and Footpath.

Works Area (To Kwa Wan):

- Completion of the intermediate test of pipeline;
- Substantial completion of installation of ICCP system;
- Completion of concrete surround of the Y-line within To Kwa Wan cofferdam;
- Completion of reinstatement of seawall blocks at To Kwa Wan cofferdam;
 and
- Commencement of reinstatement of granite facing stone at To Kwa Wan cofferdam.

Works Area (North Point):

- Completion of the intermediate test of pipeline;
- Backfilling of armour rock between CH3134 to CH3160;
- Substantial completion of backfilling of rock mound at North Point cofferdam; and
- Completion of reinstatement of North Point Pigging Station.

Environmental Monitoring and Audit Progress

Marine Water Quality

Marine water quality impact monitoring was conducted and exceedances of Limit Levels for water quality were recorded during the reporting month. Following the review of monitoring data and marine works details in accordance with the procedures stipulated in the Event and Action Plan of the EM&A Manual, these exceedances were considered to be due to natural background variation in water quality characteristics of the Victoria Harbour waters in Hong Kong.

Air Borne Noise

Five sets of 30-minute construction noise measurements were carried out at the monitoring stations FSQ and SCH02 during normal weekdays of the reporting period. No exceedances of the Action and Limit Levels were identified during the reporting period and it is considered that construction works of the Project did not appear to generate any unacceptable noise impact during the monitoring period.

Waste Management

Waste generated from this Project includes non-inert construction and demolition (C&D) materials. A total of 1.07 tonnes of general refuse were generated in this reporting month.

Environmental Site Inspection

A total of five weekly site inspections were conducted by representatives of the Contractor and the Environmental Team (ET). Joint site inspection was conducted on 29 April 2014 by the Contractor, the ET, the Resident Engineer (RE) and the Independent Environmental Checker (IEC). Details of the audit findings and implementation status of the mitigation measures are presented in *Section 5.1*.

Non-conformance/Compliant/Summons and Prosecution

No non-compliance event was recorded during the reporting period.

No environmental complaint and summon/prosecution was received in this reporting period.

Future Key Issues

Works to be undertaken in the next reporting month of May 2014 include:

- Installation of ICCP system and its accessories;
- Armour rock backfilling;
- Seawall reinstatement;
- Pipeline laying and reinstatement; and
- Test pit excavation.

Potential environmental impacts arising from the above construction activities are mainly associated with dust, construction noise, site runoff, marine water quality and waste management issues.

1 INTRODUCTION

ERM-Hong Kong, Limited (ERM) and Mott MacDonald Hong Kong Limited were appointed by the Hong Kong and China Gas Company Limited and McDow-Kaden JV as the Environmental Team (ET) and the Independent Environmental Checker (IEC), respectively, to undertake the Environmental Monitoring and Audit (EM&A) activities for the installation of submarine gas pipelines and associated facilities from To Kwa Wan to North Point for former Kai Tak Airport Development ("the Project").

1.1 Purpose of the Report

This is the 23rd Monthly EM&A Report which summarises the impact monitoring results and inspection/audit findings for the EM&A programme during the reporting period from 1 to 30 April 2014.

2 PROJECT INFORMATION

2.1 PROJECT BACKGROUND

The Project proposed by the Hong Kong and China Gas Company Limited comprises the construction of a new gas pipeline network from To Kwa Wan to North Point so as to replace the existing one affected by the proposed Cruise Terminal dredging works adjacent to the former Kai Tak runway and the proposed Central Kowloon Route crossing the Kowloon Bay at To Kwa Wan.

The EIA report (*Register No.: AEIAR-153/2010*) for the Project was approved by the Director of Environmental Protection (DEP) on 2 August 2010 under the Environmental Impact Assessment Ordinance (EIAO). Subsequent to the approval of the EIA, an EP (*Permit No. EP-401/2010*) for the Project was granted by the DEP on 6 October 2010.

2.2 GENERAL SITE DESCRIPTION

The Project involves the construction of the twin submarine gas pipelines across the Victoria Harbour from To Kwa Wan to North Point and the construction of the land gas pipelines and pigging stations for pigging operation at both To Kwa Wan and North Point.

2.3 CONSTRUCTION ACTIVITIES UNDERTAKEN DURING THE REPORTING PERIOD

A summary of the major construction activities undertaken in the reporting period is shown in *Table 2.1*. The locations of the construction activities are shown in *Annex A*.

- Commencement of reinstatement of granite facing stone at To Kwa Wan cofferdam.

Works Area (North Point):

- · Completion of the intermediate test of pipeline;
- Backfilling of armour rock between CH3134 to CH3160;
- Substantial completion of backfilling of rock mound at North Point cofferdam; and
- Completion of reinstatement of North Point Pigging Station.

3 EM&A REQUIREMENTS

3.1 MARINE WATER QUALITY MONITORING

3.1.1 Water Quality Parameters

The parameters measured *in situ* were:

- Dissolved Oxygen (DO) (% saturation and mg L-1)
- Salinity (ppt)
- Temperature (°C)
- Turbidity (NTU)

The only parameter to be measured in the laboratory was:

• Suspended solids (SS) (mg L-1)

In addition to the water quality parameters, other relevant data were measured and recorded in Water Quality Monitoring Logs, including monitoring location, time, tidal stages, weather conditions and any special phenomenon or work underway at the construction site that may influence the monitoring results.

3.1.2 Monitoring Equipment

Table 3.1 summaries the equipment used for the water quality monitoring.

3.1.3 Sampling / Testing Protocol

All *in situ* monitoring instruments were checked, calibrated and certified by the analytical laboratory before use (see calibration reports in Annex F) ⁽¹⁾. Responses of sensors and electrodes were checked with certified standard solutions before each use.

Wet bulb calibration for a DO probe was carried out at least once per monitoring day. A zero check in distilled water was performed with the

turbidity probe at least once per monitoring day. The probe was calibrated with a solution of known NTU. In addition, the turbidity probe was calibrated at least twice per month to establish the relationship between turbidity readings (in NTU) and levels of suspended solids (in mg L-1).

On-site calibration of equipment was also carried out following the "Guide to On-Site Test Methods for the Analysis of Waters", BS 1427:1993 to check the responses of sensors and electrodes using certified standard solutions before each use. Sufficient stocks of spare parts were maintained for replacements when necessary. Backup monitoring equipment was made available so that monitoring can proceed uninterrupted even when equipment is under maintenance, calibration etc.

Water samples for SS measurements were collected in high density polythene, packed in ice (cooled to 4 °C without being frozen) and delivered to the analytical laboratory as soon as possible after collection.

3.1.4 Laboratory Measurement and Analysis

Analysis of SS was carried out in a HOKLAS accredited laboratory ⁽¹⁾. Water samples of about 1 L were collected at the monitoring stations for carrying out the laboratory SS determination. The SS determination work started within 24 hours after the collection of the water samples. The SS analyses followed the standard method APHA 2540D with a detection limit of 1 mgL⁻¹ as described in *APHA Standard Methods for the Examination of Water and Wastewater*, 21st Edition, unless specified.

Quality Assurance/ Quality Control (QA/QC) details (such as blank, spike recovery, number of duplicate samples per batch etc) were provided in accordance with requirements of HOKLAS (details refer to *Annex G*).

3.1.5 Sampling Depths & Replication

Each station was sampled and measurements/ water samples were taken at three depths, namely, 1 m below water surface, mid-depth and 1 m above sea bed, except where the water depth was less than 6 m, the mid-depth station may be omitted. For stations that were less than 3 m in depth, only the mid-depth sample was taken.

For *in situ* measurements, duplicate readings were made at each water depth at each station. Duplicate water samples were collected at each water depth at each station.

3.1.6 Monitoring Locations and Frequency

Impact water quality monitoring was conducted during the marine works period at the monitoring stations listed in *Table 3.2* and shown in *Annex B1*.

In accordance with the EM&A Manual, marine water quality monitoring were conducted at six Water Sensitive Receivers (WM1, WM2, WM3, WM4, WM5 and WM6) as well as four Control stations (C1, C2, C3 and C4) (*Table 3.2*) at a frequency of three times a week during the marine works period for the Project. Monitoring was undertaken at mid-flood and mid-ebb tides during each monitoring day. The interval between two sets of consecutive monitoring was not less than 36 hours.

For scheduling, references were made to the predicted tides at Quarry Bay, which is the tidal station nearest to the Project Site, published on the website of the Hong Kong Observatory (1). Schedule for impact monitoring during this reporting period had been submitted to the Contractor, IEC, Engineer Representative (ER) and Environmental Protection Department (EPD) prior to the commencement of the monitoring works (*Annex B2*).

3.1.7 Water Quality Compliance

Water quality monitoring data were evaluated against Action and Limit Levels. The proposed Action and Limit Levels which were determined from the baseline water quality monitoring results are shown in *Table 3.3*.

In the event that the levels are exceeded, appropriate actions in the Event and Action Plan (*Annex D1*) should be undertaken and a review of works will be carried out by the Contractor(s).

3.2 AIR BORNE NOISE MONITORING

3.2.1 Monitoring Location

In accordance with the EM&A Manual, monitoring of construction noise impact should be conducted at the designated monitoring stations. The construction noise monitoring location for this Project is listed in *Table 3.4* and is shown in *Annexes C1 and C2*.

3.2.2 Monitoring Parameter and Frequency

Weekly construction noise monitoring was conducted in accordance with the requirements stipulated in the EM&A Manual. The monitoring programme for this reporting period is shown in *Annex C3*.

The construction noise levels were measured in terms of A-weighted equivalent continuous sound pressure level (L_{eq}) in decibels dB(A). $L_{eq~(30min)}$ was used as the monitoring parameter for the period in between 0700 – 1900 hours on normal weekdays. In order to obtain supplementary information for data auditing, two statistical sound levels L_{10} and L_{90} (ie the levels exceeded for 10 and 90 percent of the time, respectively), were also recorded during the monitoring for reference. The measured noise levels were logged in every 5 minutes throughout the impact monitoring period.

3.2.3 Action and Limit Levels

The Action and Limit levels for noise monitoring during different monitoring periods are summarised in *Table 3.5*.

3.2.4 Monitoring Equipment and Methodology

Construction noise measurements were conducted in accordance with the calibration and measurement procedures as stated in *Annex – General Calibration and Measurement Procedures* of *Technical Memorandum on Noise from*

^{* 70} dB(A) for schools and 65 dB(A) during school examination periods.

Construction Work other than Percussive Piling (GW-TM) issued under the Noise Control Ordinance (NCO) (Cap. 400).

The sound level meters and calibrator used for the noise measurement, as listed in *Table 3.6*, complied with *IEC 651: 1979 and 804:1985 (Type 1)* specification. The calibration certificates of the sound level meter and calibrator are included in *Annex F*.

Immediately before and after the noise measurements, the accuracy of the measurement equipment was checked using an acoustic calibrator generating a known sound pressure level at a known frequency.

3.2.5 Event and Action Plan

The Event and Action Plan (EAP) for noise monitoring is presented in *Annex D*2.

4 IMPLEMENTATION STATUS ON ENVIRONMENTAL MITIGATION MEASURES

The Contractor has implemented environmental mitigation measures and requirements as stated in the EIA Report, EP and EM&A Manual. The implementation status during the reporting period is summarised in *Annex E*.

MONITORING RESULTS

5.1 SITE INSPECTIONS & AUDITS

5

Weekly site inspections were conducted by representatives of the Contractor and the ET on 3, 10, 17 and 24 April 2014. Joint site inspection was conducted by the Contractor, the ET, the Resident Engineer (RE) and the IEC on 29 April 2014.

Major observations during the reporting period were summarised as follows:

3 April 2014

- To Kwa Wan Land-based Site:
 - One of the drip trays where two chemical drums were placed was not plugged by stopper properly. The Contractor was reminded to plug it properly to avoid the surrounding soil being contaminated by chemical and oil.
 - Nozzle was found being placed out of the drip tray. The Contractor was reminded to place it properly inside the drip tray.

10 April 2014

- To Kwa Wan Land-based Site:
 - One of the drip trays was not plugged by stopper properly. The Contractor was reminded to plug it properly to avoid the surrounding soil being contaminated by chemical and oil.
 - Some of the excavated materials were not covered properly by tarpaulin sheet. The Contractor was reminded to cover it completely by the end of the working day.

17 April 2014

- To Kwa Wan Land-based Site:
 - Some of the excavated materials were not covered properly by tarpaulin sheet. The Contractor was reminded to cover it completely by the end of the working day.
 - Stagnant water was found inside a container and recycling bins.
 The Contractor was reminded to clear it more regularly by appropriate procedures.
 - A chemical waste container was not labelled. The Contractor was reminded to label it properly and store it at designated area.

24 April 2014

- To Kwa Wan Land-based Site:
 - Drip tray of a generator was not plugged. The Contractor was asked to remind their site workers to plug it properly at all times.

- Sand and excavated materials were found very close to the waterfront without any barrier in between. The Contractor was advised to either set a temporary barrier or to move the excavated materials and sand away from the edge of the waterfront to prevent any of them from running into the sea directly.
- Stagnant water was observed in one of the drip trays. The Contractor was reminded to regularly get rid of the stagnant water in proper way and it should be disposed of as chemical waste.
- The Contractor was reminded that different kinds of refuse should be sorted properly on site.

29 April 2014

• To Kwa Wan Land-based Site:

- Stagnant water was observed in one of the drip trays. The Contractor was reminded to clear the stagnant water appropriately and regularly.
- Excavated materials were not covered properly. The Contractor was reminded either to remove it or to cover it completely.
- Two of the drip trays were not plugged (two generators). The Contractor was reminded to plug it properly to avoid the surrounding soil being contaminated by chemical and oil.
- Empty tanks should be flipped over to avoid any water accumulated.
- o Chemical drums were not placed in drip tray.
- Grabbing of rocks from seabed was observed during site audit when no permit was valid to support such action. The Contractor was urged to communicate and investigate this issue with the subcontractor.

• North Point Site:

- o The Contractor was reminded to maintain the silt curtain properly.
- Planks were observed in the trench. The Contractor was advised to remove any unnecessary items in the trench.
- An open container containing sand was observed at site without being covered. The Contractor was reminded to cover it properly by tarpaulin sheet.

5.2 MARINE WATER QUALITY MONITORING

In accordance with the requirements described in the EM&A Manual, marine water quality monitoring was conducted during periods when marine works were scheduled to be undertaken. Impact monitoring was undertaken three times per week in April 2014 for marine works (see monitoring schedule for the present monitoring period in *Annex B2*) except on 19 April 2014 during which marine works were not undertaken. During the period of impact monitoring, weather condition was generally fine.

Monitoring results are presented graphically in *Annexes B3 – B7* and key observations are described below.

DO levels from surface, mid-depth and bottom waters were generally similar amongst Control, Impact and WSD Seawater Intake stations, and DO levels were variable throughout the monitoring period which represented natural background fluctuation in water quality.

Similar to DO levels, turbidity and SS levels were generally similar amongst stations and variable throughout the monitoring period. Similar fluctuations were also observed during baseline monitoring and they are thus considered to be sporadic events and characteristic of water quality in this area of Hong Kong.

Exceedances were recorded on 2, 4, 8, 10, 12, 15, 17, 22, 24, 26, 28 and 30 April 2014. Exceedances in the Limit Levels of surface, mid-depth and bottom DO were observed. It is considered that the exceedances in DO levels are more likely to be representing natural background fluctuation in water quality rather than indicating any unacceptable water quality impacts from the Project since exceedances were recorded when marine works were not being undertaken for the Project (eg during mid-ebb tide on 24 and 30 April 2014, and during both mid-ebb and mid-flood tides on 8 and 15 April 2014). In addition, the levels of DO at the Impact Stations where exceedances were recorded were similar to those at the Control Stations, which are far away from the Project area.

Following the review of monitoring data and marine works details in accordance with the procedures stipulated in the Event and Action Plan of the EM&A Manual, these exceedances were considered to be due to natural background variation in water quality characteristics.

5.3 AIR BORNE NOISE MONITORING

Thirty-minute construction noise measurements were carried out on 4, 9, 15, 24 and 29 April 2014 at monitoring station FSQ and on 3, 10, 17, 24 and 30 April 2014 at monitoring station SCH02 during normal working hours of the reporting period (see *Annex C3* for monitoring schedule).

The monitoring results together with graphical presentations are presented in *Annexes C4 – C7*. No exceedances of Action and Limit Level were recorded in the reporting period. The local impacts observed near the monitoring stations of SCH02 and FSQ were due to traffic noise from Sung On Street and Island Eastern Corridor, respectively.

Overall, it is considered that construction works of the Project did not appear to generate any unacceptable noise impact during the monitoring period.

5.4 WASTE MANAGEMENT EM&A

Waste generated from this Project includes inert construction and demolition (C&D) materials and non-inert C&D materials. Reference has been made to the Monthly Summary Waste Flow Table prepared by the Contractor (*Annex*

H). The waste statistics provided in this section represent the cumulative quantity of wastes generated from all sites in this Project. With reference to relevant handling records and trip tickets of this Project, the quantities of different types of waste generated in the reporting month are summarised in *Table 5.1*. 1.07 tonnes of non-inert C&D Materials were generated in April 2014 and disposed of at the SENT Landfill.

6.3 SUMMARY OF ENVIRONMENTAL SUMMON AND SUCCESSFUL PROSECUTION

No summons/ prosecution was received during the reporting period. The cumulative compliant/summons/prosecution log is shown in *Annex I*.

FUTURE KEY ISSUES

7.1 CONSTRUCTION ACTIVITIES FOR THE COMING MONTH

Works to be undertaken for the coming monitoring periods are summarised in *Table 7.1*.

Potential environmental impacts arising from the above construction activities are mainly associated with dust, construction noise, site runoff, marine water quality and waste management issues.

7.2 MONITORING SCHEDULE FOR THE COMING MONTH

The tentative schedules of marine water quality and noise monitoring for the next reporting period of May 2014 are presented in *Annex B8* and *Annex C8*, respectively.

Environmental monitoring will be conducted at the same monitoring locations in the next reporting period. The monitoring programme has been reviewed and is considered adequate to cater for the nature of works in progress.

7.3 SOLID AND LIQUID WASTE MANAGEMENT STATUS

As the major construction works in the coming month are armour rock backfilling and seawall reinstatement, waste generated from this Project for the coming month will include inert and non-inert C&D materials. Part of the inert C&D materials will be stockpiled on site for reuse and the remaining will be disposed of at Tseung Kwan O Area 137 Fill Bank. Chemical waste will be stored at designated area and collected by a licensed collector. Surface runoff, sewage and wastewater will be reduced using proper site management such as the use of sedimentation tanks with sufficient capacity, vehicle and plant cleaning before leaving a construction site, etc (detailed in *Annex E*). General refuse generated from the Project will be disposed of at the SENT Landfill.

CONCLUSION

This 23rd Monthly EM&A Report presents the EM&A programme undertaken during the reporting period from 1 to 30 April 2014 in accordance with EM&A Manual and requirements of the EP (EP-401/2010).

Construction phase water quality monitoring was conducted in accordance with the requirements described in the EM&A Manual. Exceedances of Action and Limit Levels for water quality were recorded in twelve (12) monitoring events in this reporting period. The review of monitoring data and works activities undertaken suggested that marine works have proceeded in an environmentally acceptable manner.

Thirty-minute construction noise measurements were carried out on 4, 9, 15, 24 and 29 April 2014 at monitoring station FSQ and on 3, 10, 17, 24 and 30 April 2014 at monitoring station SCH02 during normal working hours of the reporting period. No exceedances of the Action and Limit Levels were identified during the reporting period and it is considered that construction works of the Project did not appear to generate any unacceptable noise impact during the monitoring period.

Weekly site inspections were conducted in the reporting period. Mitigation measures recommended in the EIA/ EM&A manual/ EP were implemented by the Contractor. Follow-up actions for the observed environmental deficiency during the site inspections were taken as reported by the Contractor and observed in the next weekly site inspection conducted.

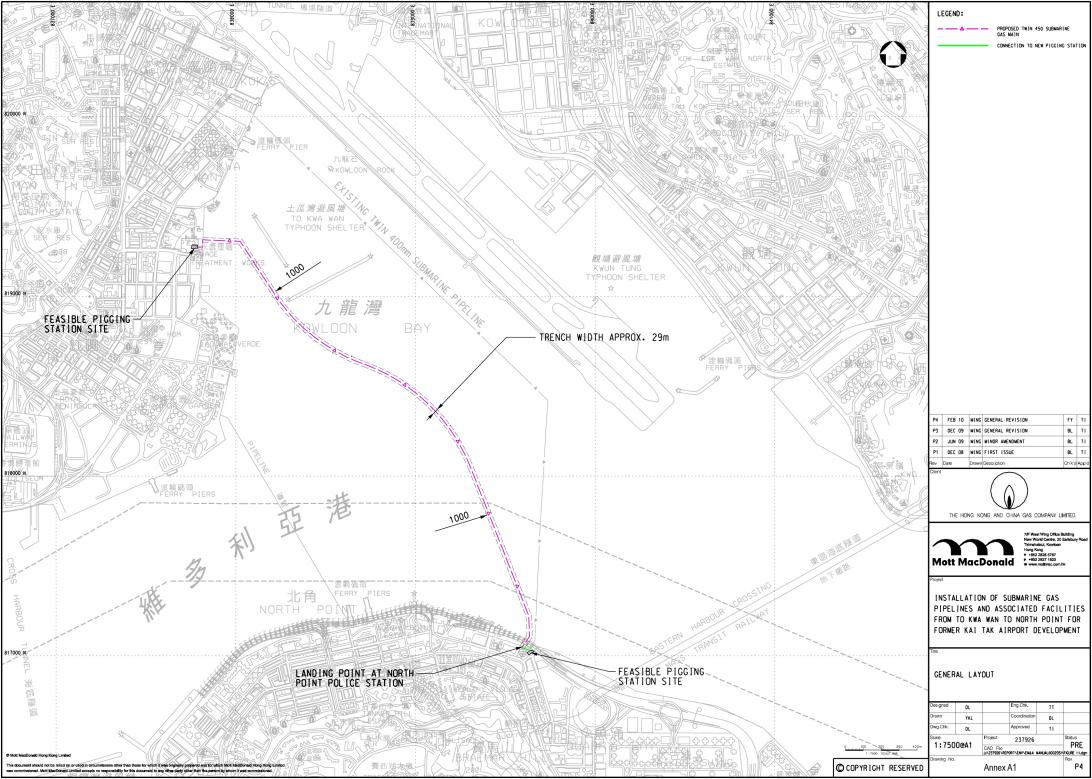
No non-compliance event was recorded during the reporting period.

The ET will keep track of the EM&A programme to ensure compliance of environmental requirements and the proper implementation of all necessary mitigation measures in the coming periods.

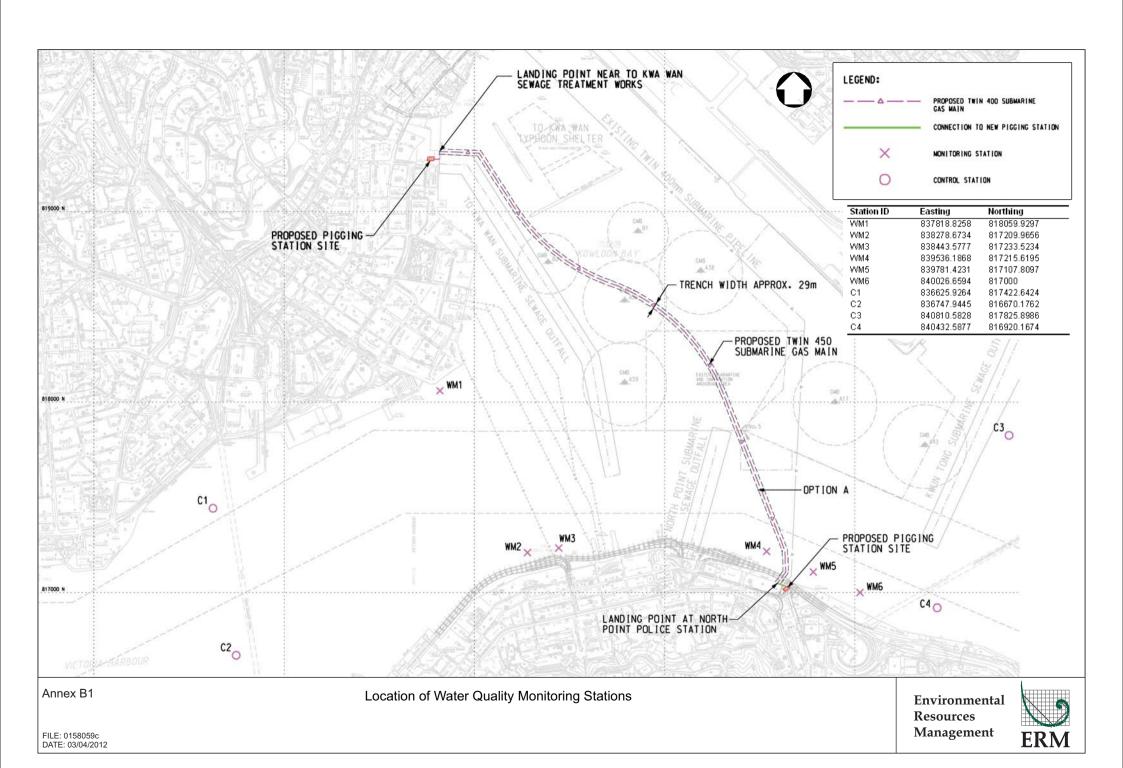
Annex A

Locations of Works Area



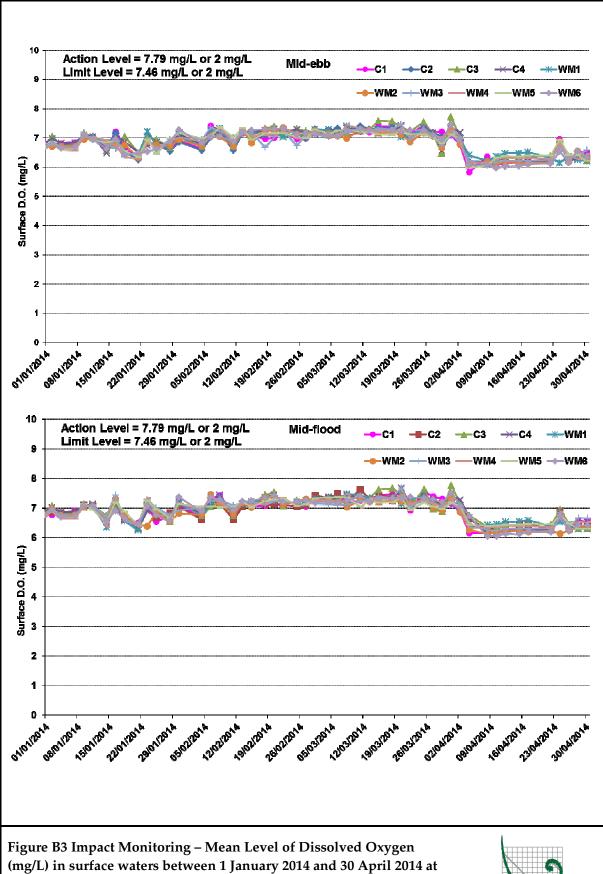

Marine Water Quality Monitoring



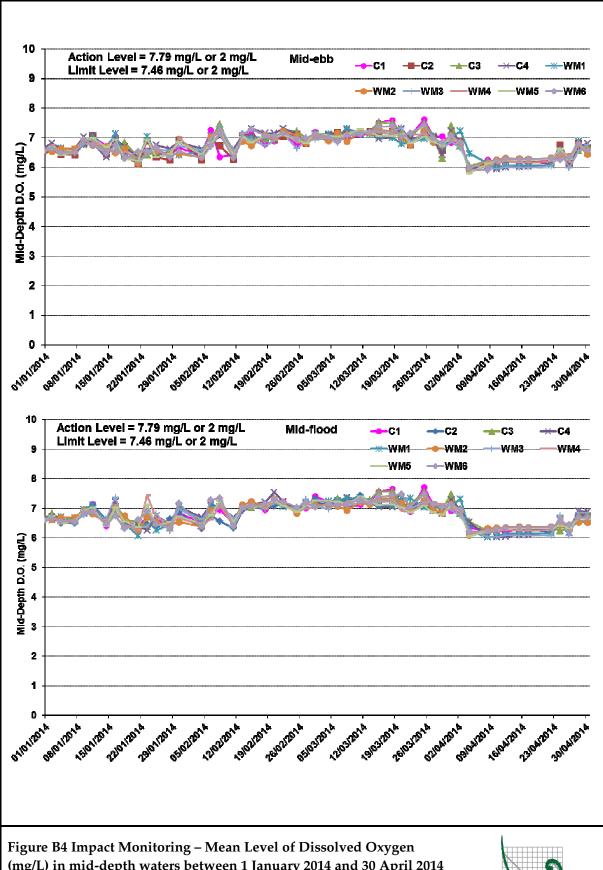

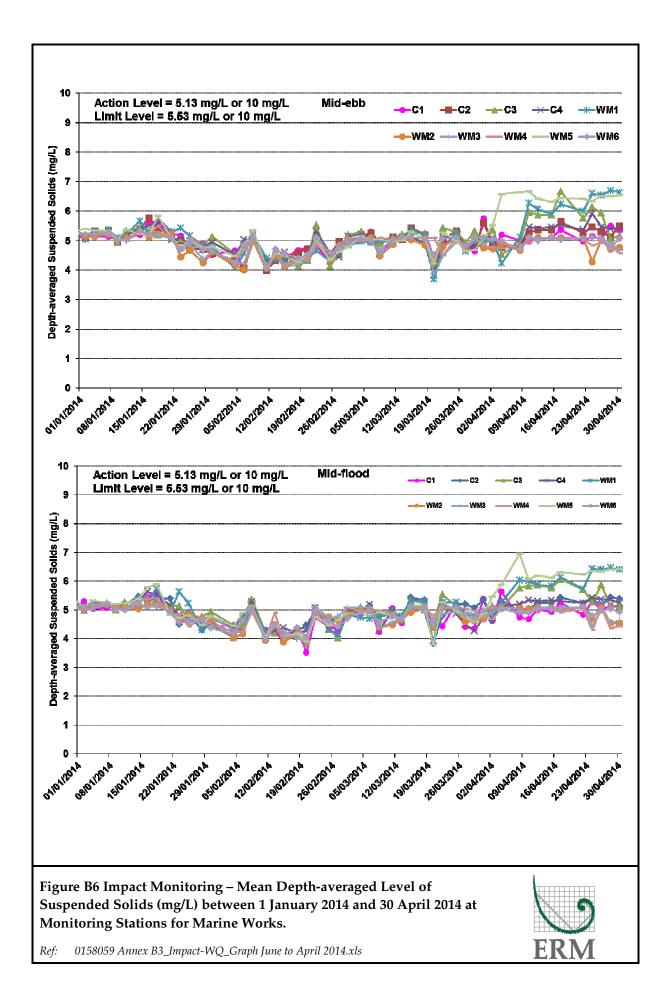


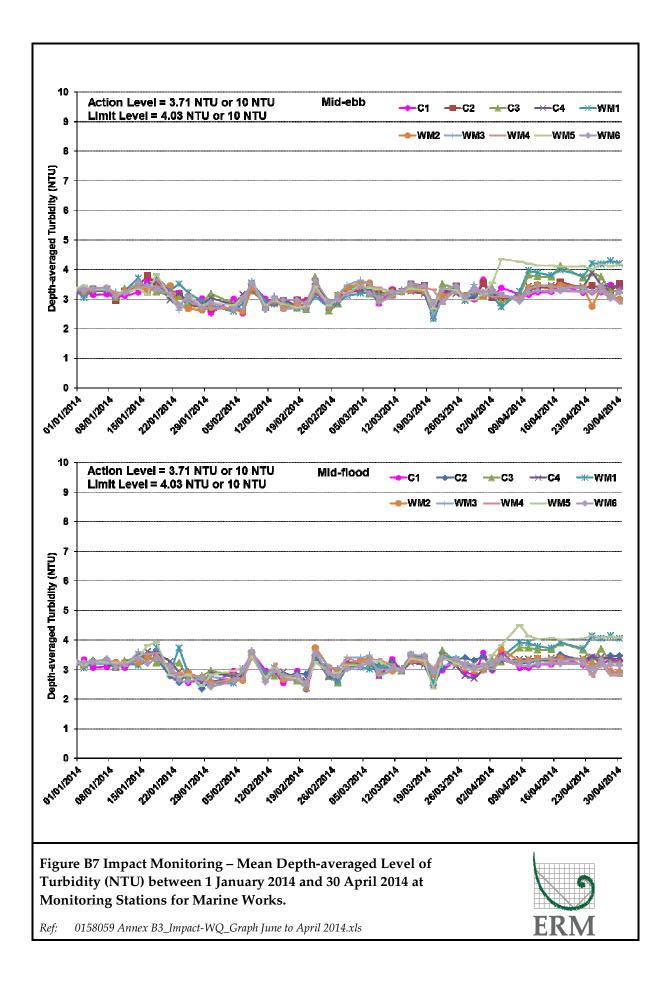


(mg/L) in mid-depth waters between 1 January 2014 and 30 April 2014 at Monitoring Stations for Marine Works.







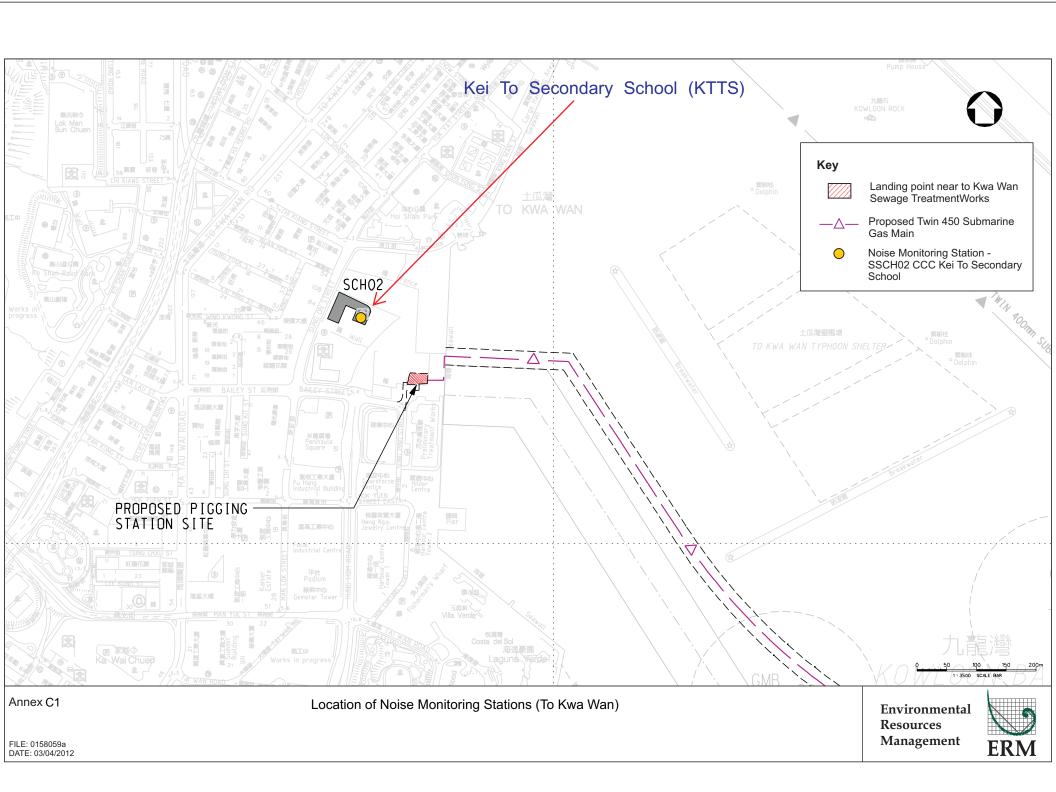


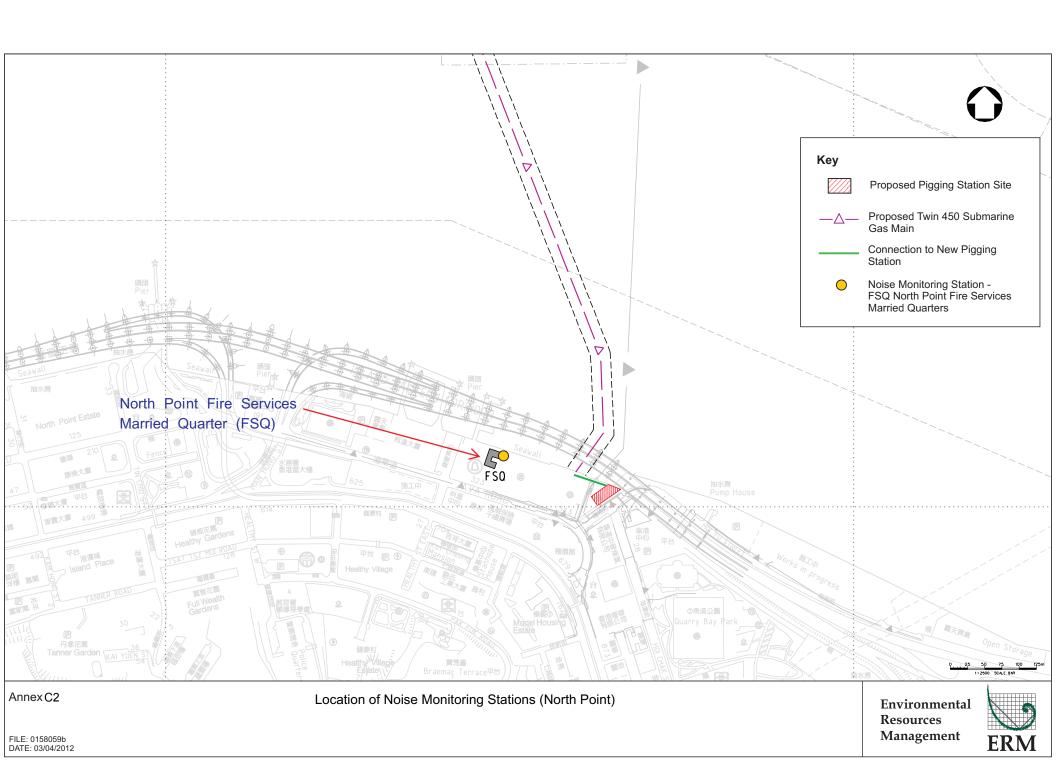

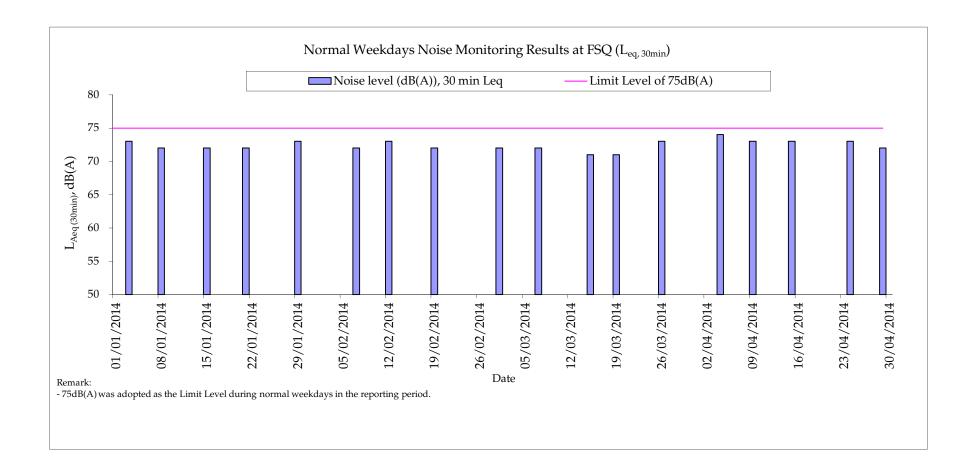

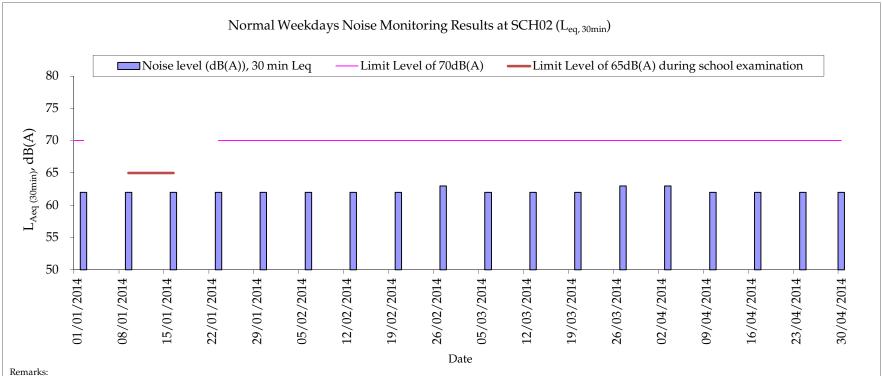
