Surrounding Environment: within rural village surroundings and pond in front of the village		
<p>Historical Appraisal: Lan Fong Study Hall at Chuk Hang was established by Tang Kwok-tsun in 1862 (Qing Dynasty). The building was used as a study hall and a place to hold Chinese festivals.</p> <p>During the 1920 and 30's it was used as a school, Lan Fong School. In 1941, the study hall was left vacant until the 1970s when Lan Fong Kindergarten was established.</p>		
Associated Historical/ Cultural Events or Individual: None.		
Inscriptions (from perspective of reader): None		
<p>Architectural Appraisal: Large rectangular brick with cut stone corner compound with inner courtyard. Two pitched roofs with pan and roll tile system roofs. Geometric roof ridge decorations.</p> <p>Centre recessed façade with single entrance gate/door. Frieze with moulded decoration under gable and painted freeze with inscription above the door. Door stone lintel and doorstep.</p>

Surrounding Environment: rural setting at southern end of small village and near a stream		
Historical Appraisal: The chapel was constructed in 1928 with the sponsorship of overseas converts. The chapel is known to have been used by the villagers of Kam Tsin Wai before the Japanese Occupation. Since the 1960s, the religious role of the Chapel was gradually substituted by the chapel at Kam Tsin Wai and St. Jude's Mass Centre near Kat Hing Wai. The Chapel was vacated around the 1980s.		
Associated Historical/ Cultural Events or Individual: None.		
Inscriptions (from perspective of reader): None		
Architectural Appraisal: Brick rectangular building with pitched roof and smaller vestibule at back.  Main entrance at the end of the building with windows and side entrance with simple lintels and moulded canopies above.  Balcony on rectangular pillars above main entrance wooden door with ceramic grilles. Parapet with space for bell and with cross above façade.
